Ash Wednesday has been honored by Christians through the ages. It is the beginning of Lent, the six-week season of preparation for Easter.

Just as Job repented "in dust and ashes," (Job 42:6) so did the earliest Christians who had ashes sprinkled on their bodies as an outward sign of repentance. This outward sign, however, speaks of two decisions occurring at the same time - repentance and belief.

The starkness of the season reflects the stark honesty with which we approach God and gives us permission to freely acknowledge our own imperfections before God and with each other. The external sign reflects an internal decision to follow, to forgive each other, and to forgive ourselves. The culmination of this self-acceptance is the bodily resurrection of Christ, dying for us and truly risen in love...from the ashes of our sin.
