
Although Hardy's Senior Pastoralship with Second B ended in the late 1980s, Hardy continued to be a guest proclaimer on numerous occasions through the following years and decades at Second B.

Second B's new and inclusive spirit took on the cultural challenges of each decade. In 1967, **Dr. Hardy Clemons** was called as senior pastor. His groundbreaking imple-



mentation of "team ministry," which included women, began to blossom as the means of taking Christian commitment into daily life. "Every member a minister" became a new emphasis as the church ushered in the next decade as a "Contemporary People of God."






HARDY CLEMONS RECOMMENDED

Pulpit Committee Recommends Clemons

On Sunday August 6, the Pulpit Committee unanimously recommended to the church the calling of Dr. Hardy S. Clemons. At the Prayer Meeting time Wednesday, the entire committee came before the congregation, explained the work they had done and why they were making this recommendation. A full report was given in writing as well as verbally, and reprinted in last week's issue of The Second Page.

The Clemons family, Hardy, Ardelle, and daughter Kay, were guests of the Pulpit Committee this past weekend. All the members of church divisions, committees, and teachers and officers were invited to meetings that were held with Mr. Clemons. Members were given opportunity to raise questions and explain the unique congregational organization of the church.

Mr. Clemons was the pulpit guest at all three worship services Sunday August 13. The entire congregation was invited to meet and talk with him Sunday evening. A large group of persons responded to this invitation and the hour and one half conversation with that group helped many more members to become personally acquainted with the Clemons family.

At the regular church conference on Wednesday, August 16, the church was called to act upon the recommendation of the Pulpit Committee. This issue of The Second Page "goes to press" on Monday noon. Pages 2 and 3 of this issue have been left blank in order that an up-to-the-minute report may be written after Wednesday's conference.

BILL HAMILTON, CHAIRMAN OF THE PULPIT COMMITTEE, REACHED CLEMONS IN NASH-VILLE, TENNESSEE, WHERE HE IS ATTENDING A WRITERS' CONFERENCE OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD. IN A BRIEF MESSAGE TO THE CONGREGATION HE SAID, "IT IS WITH A GENUINE SENSE OF CALLING THAT I ACCEPT THE INVITATION TO BE YOUR PASTOR. ARDELL AND I ARE EXCITED ABOUT RETURNING TO LUBBOCK AND ARE CHALLENGED AT THE THOUGHT OF BEING PART OF THE DISTINCTIVE MINISTRY OF SECOND BAPTIST CHURCH. 





ange within a continuing framework keynoted the ninth year of the vibrant life of the Second Baptist Church. Beloved familiar faces were replaced by new faces.

The first change came with the resignation of Doctor Judson Maynard, organist and director of choirs. Larry Douglas was selected as the first full-time Minister of Music of the church.

Health developments within the family of Pastor Bob Hearn led first to a leave of absence then to his resignation. Great regret mingled with much love and understanding from the congregation as the Hearn family moved to New York, accepted the pastorate of Olivet Baptist Church in Valley Stream, New York, and began preparations to enter the field of religious counseling.

Parkdale Pastor Durrell Davison resigned to do mission work in New Mexico. George P. Young was called to the pastorate. In February he and his family moved to Lubbock from Halfway, Texas. During the interim period, Mrs. Bob Wade served as co-ordinator for the Weekday Program at Parkdale.

During Pastor Hearn's leave of absence and following his resignation, the pastoral duties were ably discharged by Pastors Herman Williams and Robert Wells, and by members of the church. On April 19, a Pulpit Committee was named by the church to fill the pastoral vacancy. Elected to serve were Everette Abernathie, Roy Bass, Mrs. H. R. Bundock, Dr. and Mrs. Dan English, Dr. Berlie Fallon, Bill Hamilton, Dr. Gerald Marable, Alex Miller, Mrs. Harold Murdock, Mrs. Ruth Seveland, and Mrs. Don Thompson. Mr. Hamilton was elected chairman; Dr. English, vice chairman; and Mrs. Seveland, secretary.

The Pulpit Committee unanimously recommended that the church call Dr. Hardy Clemons as Pastor. On August 13, Dr. Clemons and his family visited the church, and he was pulpit guest at all three worship services. At Church Conference August 16, the congregation called Dr. Clemons as Pastor. He and his family will move to Lubbock and begin his ministry September 1, 1967.

Many outstanding Christians have come to inspire us. Dr. Nat Tracy, Chairman of the Division of Religion and Philosophy at Howard Payne College, was discussion leader for a deacons' retreat in August. Dr. Ernest Ligon, founder and director of Character Research Project at Union College, Schenectady, New York, and Dr. Sally Smith reported on progress of the CRP. Filling the pulpit at various times have been Dr. Foy Valentine, Executive Secretary of the Christian Life Commission; Dr. Charles P. McLaughlin, Secretary of the State Missions Commission; Dr. Roy McClung, President of Wayland Baptist

College; Dr. H. Guy Moore, President of William Jewell College; and Dr. Tracy. Mrs. Gordon Cosby, from The Church of the Savior in Washington, D. C., led the Couples' Retreat in April.

"Days of Commitment," the fall revival, was led by Dr. John R. Killinger, Jr., Professor of Preaching in Vanderbilt Divinity School. Dr. Blake Smith, pastor of University Baptist Church, Austin, Texas, led a series of worship services in May entitled "Enjoying God."

On January 1, 1967, Robert Wells was ordained into the ministry. Dr. Bruce Evans, pastor of Fellowship Church, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, preached the ordination sermon and led the ministers and deacons in the ordination ceremony.

Parkdale Mission made vast strides in seeking to reach the people of its area. Due to the success of the summer kindergarten at Parkdale, another kindergarten was instituted on Saturday mornings. The kindergarten was staffed by Senior High students with professional direction by Mrs. Tom Wilkinson. The church's two congregations have drawn closer together by joint Worship services and increased missionary involvement, which has brought desire for spiritual growth.

A new vision of mission was seen by the WMU of Second Baptist. The WMU was reorganized into groups of persons engaged in missionary activity. Miss Elaine Dickson from the Southwide WMU in Birmingham came in September to encourage the church in this new venture and to work with persons who would be guiding this experimental program. Mrs. Don Thompson, editor of The Second Page, was chosen to write a guide to be used throughout the convention. She taught her new book "Missionary Action - Economically Disadvantaged" at WMU Leadership Conferences at Ridgecrest and Glorieta.

Elected to the Executive Committee of Deacons to serve for three year terms beginning January 1, 1967, were Everette Abernathie, Roy Bass, Bill Kingsbery, Tom Moorhead, Calvin Stewart, and Don Thompson. The Executive Committee elected Dr. Gerald Marable to serve as chairman and Calvin Stewart to assume the duties of vice chairman. Ordination for six men was held in June. The new deacons are Dr. Dan English, Glyn Hearn, Bill King, Bob Lynch, Les Traweek, and Stephen Von Phul.

Undergirding the changes of the year has been increased interest in Bible study. Bible study has increased in the College of Christian Life, in men and women's Bible study groups, and in the Sunday School. College and Career and Junior 4 departments are trying new approaches in Bible study. The leadership of the Holy Spirit through the Scripture will undoubtedly bring the church to new and exciting opportunities in the year to come.

ollowing the leadership of the Holy Spirit, Second Baptist Church began its tenth year as Dr. Hardy Clemons being called as Pastor. He, his wife, Ardelle, and daughter, Kay, began their minis-

try on September 1.

Mission outreach had an unusually productive year. Bill Lawson, Pastor of Wheeler Avenue Baptist Church in Houston, inspired all who attended the World Mission Emphasis and banquet in December. Pastor Herman Williams spent a week in preaching and leadership training with the Wheeler Avenue congregation. Two new Mission Action groups were begun this year. The Hospital Mission Action Group, composed of both men and women, provides a unique ministry to patients in Methodist Hospital who need special, personal help. The Mission Study Group is a Circle for persons who are not participating in one of the direct mission ministries. This group has been especially meaningful to the elderly ladies living at Sherick Memorial Home. Other Mission Action groups, such as Mothers' Clubs, Sick-baby Clinic, Bible Study, Nursery, and Kindergarten at Parkdale, as well as the Church Visitation Group, have also been quite active this year.

Parkdale Mission, led by Pastor George Young, has continued a valuable Christian ministry to persons in economically disadvantaged areas of Lubbock. Improvements to the Parkdale building, such as central heating, new playground equipment, draperies for the baptistry, redecorating the Pastor's study, new wiring and repair of the Clinic, enhanced the effectiveness of this mini-

stry. A new bus was also added.

Youth ministry has received great emphasis this year. Second Baptist, along with other churches, established a coffee house. The Inner Ear, near the Texas Tech campus. Pastor Robert Wells helped create this outreach ministry. College young people plan the programs, serve tables, and talk with the persons who attend. The Inner Ear has provided opportunity to contact college young people who might not otherwise be reached.

Pointed toward particular contemporary problems of junior and senior high students and their parents, a discussion series, "The Tuned-Out Generation," was led by Dr. and Mrs. Gerald

Marable and Robert Wells.

Senior high students, led by Mrs. Duncan Ellison, staffed a summer kindergarten for economically disadvantaged children not eligible for Head Start. Senior highs also began FLOC (For Love of Children), providing teaching and worship opportunities for pre-schoolers during the 10:45 worship hour so that parents could worship together.

As always, retreats at Mo-Ranch near Kerrville and at Sipapu Lodge near Tres Ritos, New Mexico, sparked the interest of the junior and

senior high-ers!

Under the inspiration of Herman Williams, Vacation Bible School at Second Baptist wore a new face this year. Called Summer Creativity, it consisted of one week of intensive Bible study, mission study and crafts. This program continued each Thursday for six weeks as a day-camp type program, from 10:00 until 3:30. Time was used for field trips, picnics, intensive Bible study, and more elaborate creative activities. Parents, whose children were enrolled, contributed their time and talents to provide these unusual opportunities.

A new approach to financial stewardship, "Challenge '68," was introduced this year. Designed to encourage maturity, each member was asked to make his commitment and his gifts to God, naming no specific amount to the church. Dr. John Bradford provided outstanding guidance in a sacrificial giving campaign conducted in June. The church retired the original building note eight months early.

Several fascinating Christian personalities stimulated our thinking and encouraged our faith this year. These included Mr. and Mrs. O. K. Armstrong, the authors of *The Indomitable Baptists*; Bill Lawson, Pastor of Wheeler Avenue Baptist Church, Houston; Robert Proctor from the Character Research Project; Dr. Sterling Price, Pastor of Third Baptist Church, St. Louis; Dr. Cecil Osborne, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Burlingame, California, and the author of *The* Art of Understanding Yourself; and Dr. George Schweitzer, professor of chemistry at the University of Tennessee. Dr. Schweitzer led a series of lectures and discussions on "Christian Faith in an Age of Science," which attracted a widely varied audience from other Christian groups and Texas Tech as well as from Second Baptist.

Race relations received attention from both our men and youth. The men's group met with a number of Lubbock's Negro leaders to improve inter-racial understanding, to discuss issues, to pin-point problems of our community, and to try

to help in the Name of Christ.

New Executive Council members are, Chester Marston, Chairman, Everette Abernathie, Mrs. H. R. Bundock, and Bill Hamilton.

Examples of Second Baptist members living out Christian Commitment in government include a school board member, Bill Kingsbery, the city's Mayor pro-tem, Dr. Jim Granberry, plus chairmen and members of many city and county

boards and commissions.

Music has added a great deal to the life of the church. Minister of Music, Larry Douglas, organized and co-ordinated the graded choirs and directed a most memorable and impressive choir graduation concert. Special presentations covered a broad spectrum from Vivaldi's Gloria, a classic musical work, to traditional folk music with guitars, string bass, and autoharp. Visiting choirs included the Houston Baptist College Singers under the direction of R. Paul Green, Youth Choir of Broadway Baptist, Fort Worth, led by Malcolm Edwards, and the College Choir of the Tech BSU and First Baptist, Lubbock, led by Dan Yeary. The latter group presented "Good News." Second Baptist joined with First Baptist Church and the Bapt'st Student Union to sponsor The Continental Singers and Orchestra at Lubbock Municipal Auditorium.

The Church Library continued to grow and received a larger home. Additional space has allowed the creation of a reading room where Bible commentaries, reference books, and period-

icals are available.

In July, Second Baptist lost two beloved members from the church office staff. Maurine Morris became the bride of Mr. Curlee Cummings and moved to Austin. Veta Blackburn, her husband, Doug, and their daughter, Marcia, moved to Denton.

Second Baptist Church's Tenth Year year of challenge, change, and commitment. Now -- supported by the matchless love of God, committed to doing His will, and surrounded by the agape love of the fellowship -- we begin our second decade.

Under Hardy Clemons' leadership, the church continued to grow and expand its ministry into the local community.

Second B welcomed renowned theologian **Dr. John Claypool** to the pastoral team in 1982, once again breaking the cultural mold as Hardy and John joined to create a new model for pastoral care and leadership.
